The Rural Economic Development Loan and Grant programs provide funding for rural projects through local utility organizations. USDA provides zero-interest loans to local utilities which they in turn, pass through to local businesses (ultimate recipients) for projects that will create and retain employment in rural areas. The ultimate recipients repay the lending utility directly. The utility then is responsible for repayment to USDA.

USDA provides grants to local utility organizations which use the funding to establish Revolving Loan Funds (RLFs). Loans are made from the revolving loan funds to projects that will create or retain rural jobs. When the revolving loan fund is terminated, the grant is repaid to USDA.

The Agency anticipates the following maximum amounts per award: Loans - \$2,000,000; Grants - \$300,000.

Grant and Per Diem (GPD) Program Introduction

The GPD Program is VA's largest transitional housing program for Veterans experiencing homelessness and is permanently authorized under Public Law

109-461.

Since 1994, the GPD Program has awarded grants to community-based organizations to provide transitional housing with wraparound supportive services to assist vulnerable Veterans move into permanent housing. The grants are designed to meet Veterans at various stages as they move to stable housing. Community-based organizations receiving GPD grants offer focused transitional housing services through a variety of housing models targeted to different populations and needs of Veterans. The GPD program plays a vital role in the continuum of homeless services by providing supportive services to those Veterans who would otherwise be among the unsheltered homeless population. The result of GPD programs is that Veterans achieve residential stability, increase their skill levels and/or income, and obtain greater

Types of GPD Grants

self-determination.

Transitional housing grants:

Per Diem Only (PDO) grants provide funding in the form of per diem payments to reimburse grantees for the cost of care provided to Veterans in transitional supportive housing.

Special Need grants target housing and services to specific populations of Veterans (e.g., women, Veterans with chronic mental illness, frail elderly Veterans, Veterans caring for minor dependents, terminally ill Veterans). Transition-In-Place (TIP) grants offer Veteran residents housing in which supportive services transition out of the residence over time, rather than the resident. Upon completion of the TIP services, the resident retains the unit as their permanent housing with no requirement to move.

Other types of grants:

Case Management grants support Veterans who were previously experiencing homelessness or who are at risk for homelessness so that they may obtain or retain permanent housing.

Capital grants support the costs of acquiring, renovating, or constructing facilities and are only offered intermittently to improve existing facilities or to develop new transitional housing depending on VA's priorities and funding availability.

How to Apply for GPD Funding

Not all grant types are available annually. When available, notices of funding can be found at the following

locations: www.grants.gov and https://www.va.gov/homeless/gpd.asp.

Application instructions are provided in each notice of funding.

Each notice of funding will clarify specific eligibility criteria, application requirements, funding limitations, and other requirements.

Applications are submitted through an online portal that is only available when there is an open notice of funding.

Potential applicants who wish to see what was required for previous applications may review past notices of funding, available on the GPD provider website and www.grants.gov. Past notices of funding are not a guarantee of future requirements.





Office of Native Hawaiian Relations Grants:

Heritage Opportunities in Hawaiʻi (HŌʻIHI) Grant Program:

The Native American Tourism and Improving Visitor Experience (NATIVE) Act, was introduced by U.S. Senators Brian Schatz (D-HI) and John Thune (R-S.D.). The Act seeks to enhance and integrate native tourism, empower native communities, and expand unique cultural tourism opportunities in the United States.

- The Office of Native Hawaiian Relations is providing \$1 million in funding for Native Hawaiian organizations through the <u>HŌ'IHI Grant Program</u>.
- The funding is made possible by the Native American Tourism and Improving Visitor Experience (NATIVE, Act), which has enabled Indigenous communities to participate in national tourism goals and strategies.

Kapapahuliau Climate Resilience Program:

To enhance the ability of the Native Hawaiian Community to navigate the effects of climate change in ways that maintain the integrity and identity of the Native Hawaiian people while also maintaining and enhancing their capacity for coping, adaptation, and transformation.

- The Office of Native Hawaiian Relations (ONHR), a dedicated office under the Office of the Secretary of the U.S. Department of the Interior, has announced a \$20 million climate resilience initiative funded by the 2022 Inflation Reduction Act.
- Named for the imagery of navigating changing winds and currents on a Hawaiian voyaging wa'a (canoe), the <u>Kapapahuliau Climate Resilience Program</u> aims to enhance the ability of the Native Hawaiian Community to navigate the effects of climate change in ways that maintain their integrity and identity as a people.

Office of Hawai'ian Affairs Community Grants Program

<u>Grants</u> – The purpose of the Office of Hawai'ian Affairs Grants Program is to support Hawai'i based **nonprofit organizations** that have projects, programs, and initiatives to serve our Lāhui in alignment with OHA's Strategic Foundations, Directions & Outcomes.

Resources

Providing resources is among the key ways that the Office of Hawai'ian Affairs fulfills its purpose.

The best possible Native Hawai'ian historical and cultural information has been just a click away since the launch in April 2013 of the <u>Kipuka Database</u>. It is a searchable online geographic information system that makes data that once would have taken long to compile, now available within seconds. The database helps complement our other key research tools, such as the <u>Native Hawai'ian Data Book</u> and the <u>Papakilo Database</u>, which is a digital library for Native Hawai'ian historical and cultural information.

In addition, we launched <u>Kamakako'i</u>, an issues-based digital media tool that has been years in the making. The cutting-edge website provides a platform to quickly engage key audiences and inspire action on policy matters important to the Native Hawai'ian community.

U.S. Department of Agriculture

Earlier this year, the U.S. Department of Agriculture cut two federal programs that provided about \$1 billion in funding to schools and food banks to buy food directly from local farms, ranchers and producers. The move cancels about \$660 million in funding this year for the Local Food for Schools program, which is active in 40 U.S. states, as well as about \$420 million for a second program called the Local Food Purchase Assistance Cooperative Agreement, which helps food banks and other local groups provide food to their communities.

According to published reports, "USDA can confirm it has provided notice to States, Territories and Tribes that the FY 2025 funding previously announced for the pandemic-era Local Food for Schools and Child Care Cooperative Agreement and pandemic-era Local Food Purchase Assistance Cooperative Agreement program is no longer available and those agreements will be terminated following 60-day notification," a spokesperson with the agency said in an email to CBS News.

This program assists agricultural producers enter into value-added activities related to the processing and marketing of new products. The goals of this program are to generate new products, create and expand marketing opportunities and increase producer income.

Rural Decentralized Water Systems Grant Program in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program helps qualified nonprofits and tribes create a revolving loan fund to increase access to clean, reliable water and septic systems for households in eligible rural areas.

Rural Business Development Grants in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program is designed to provide technical assistance and training for small rural businesses.

Advanced Biofuel Payment Program in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program aims to increase the production of advanced biofuels.

Rural Cooperative Development Grant Program in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program improves the economic condition of rural areas by helping individuals and businesses start, expand or improve rural cooperatives and other mutually-owned businesses through Cooperative Development Centers.

Socially-Disadvantaged Groups Grant in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program provides technical assistance to socially-disadvantaged groups through cooperatives and Cooperative Development Centers.

Rural Energy for America Technical Assistance Grant Program in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

Business & Industry Loan Guarantees in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program offers loan guarantees to lenders for their loans to rural businesses.

Calendar Year 2022 Disaster Water Grants Program in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

Calendar Year 2022 Disaster Water Grants help eligible communities handle expenses related to incidents (Presidentially declared disasters) that damaged water systems.

Community Facilities Direct Loan & Grant Program in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program provides affordable funding to develop essential community facilities in rural areas.

Community Facilities Guaranteed Loan Program in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program provides loan guarantees to eligible lenders to develop essential community facilities in rural areas.

Emergency Community Water Assistance Grants in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program helps eligible communities prepare, or recover from, an emergency that threatens the availability of safe, reliable drinking water.

Intermediary Relending Program in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program provides 1 percent low-interest loans to local lenders or "intermediaries" that re-lend to businesses to improve economic conditions and create jobs in rural communities.

Mutual Self-Help Housing Technical Assistance Grants in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program provides grants to qualified organizations to help them carry out local self-help housing construction projects.

Rural Business Investment Program in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program provides a Rural Business Investment Company (RBIC) license to newly formed developmental capital organizations to help meet the equity capital investment needs in rural communities.

Rural Economic Development Loan & Grant Programs in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program provides funding for rural projects through local utility organizations. **Rural Housing Site Loans in Hawai'i and Western Pacific**

This program provides two types of loans to purchase and develop housing sites for low- and moderate-income families - Section 523 and Section 524.

Rural Microentrepreneur Assistance Program in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program provides loans and grants to Microenterprise Development Organizations (MDOs); To help microenterprises startup and grow and provide training and technical assistance to microloan borrowers and micro entrepreneurs.

<u>SEARCH - Special Evaluation Assistance for Rural Communities and Households Grant in</u> Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program helps very small, financially distressed rural communities with predevelopment feasibility studies, design and technical assistance on proposed water and waste disposal projects.

Single Family Housing Direct Home Loans in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program assists low- and very-low-income applicants obtain decent, safe and sanitary housing in eligible rural areas by providing payment assistance to increase an applicant's repayment ability.

Single Family Housing Repair Loans & Grants in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program provides loans to very-low-income homeowners to repair, improve or modernize their homes or grants to elderly very-low-income homeowners to remove health and safety hazards.

Water & Waste Disposal Loan & Grant Program in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program provides funding for clean and reliable drinking water systems, sanitary sewage disposal, sanitary solid waste disposal, and storm water drainage to households and businesses in eligible rural areas.

Water & Waste Disposal Loan Guarantees in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program helps private lenders provide affordable financing to qualified borrowers to improve access to clean, reliable water and waste disposal systems for households and businesses in rural areas.

Water & Waste Disposal Predevelopment Planning Grants in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

This program assists low-income communities with initial planning and development of applications for USDA Rural Development Water and Waste Disposal direct loan/grant and loan guarantee programs.

Water and Waste Facility Loans and Grants to Alleviate Health Risks on Tribal Lands in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

What does this program do? This program helps get safe, reliable drinking water and waste disposal services to low-income communities that face significant health risks.

Community Facilities Program Disaster Grants in Hawai'i and Western Pacific

What does this program do? This program provides grants to repair essential community facilities in rural areas that were damaged by Presidentially Declared Disasters in Calendar Year 2022 or to repair or replace essential community facilities damaged by Presidentially Declared Disasters

This program helps qualified nonprofits create revolving loan funds that can provide financing to extend and improve water and waste disposal systems in rural areas.

This program awards grants to help non-profit housing and community development organizations, low-income rural communities and federally recognized tribes support housing, community facilities and community and economic development projects in rural areas.





It has also been reported that Trump administration officials are recommending the elimination of the scientific research division at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. While this is subject to Congressional approval or modification, the following are what is under consideration. The budget allocation for NOAA is of just over \$170 million, down from about \$485 million in 2024.

Programs that retained funding, including research into tornado warnings and ocean acidification, would be relocated to the National Weather Service and National Ocean Service offices.

According to the New York Times on April 11, 2025, "NOAA, which takes up more than half of the Commerce Department budget, would receive just over \$4.4 billion, a reduction of \$1.6 billion from 2025.

That includes reducing the budget for the National Marine Fisheries Service by one-third. The office would be split from NOAA and moved to the Interior Department's U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Grants that fund species recovery and habitat conservation would be eliminated.

Funding for National Ocean Service, a branch of NOAA, would be cut in half. Programs like the National Centers for Coastal Ocean Science, an office within the ocean service that studies corals, pollution, and the effect of climate change and sea-level rise on coastal communities, would not be funded."

The NOAA programs operating in Hawaii are currently appearing on the NOAA website follows. There is tremendous upheaval at NOAA so the following list of programs designated as "Open" in Hawaii for the Sea Grant Program must be seen as highly unlikely. The Agency is in tremendous flux.



Meeting Needs in Hawaii

Last year more than **2,700** Americans of all ages and backgrounds united to meet local needs, strengthen communities, and expand opportunity through national service in Hawaii. AmeriCorps invested more than **\$8.5 million** in federal funding to support cost-effective community solutions, working hand in hand with local partners to empower individuals to help communities tackle their toughest challenges.

AmeriCorps members and AmeriCorps Seniors volunteers are preparing today's students for tomorrow's jobs, helping communities and families impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, connecting veterans to services, fighting the opioid epidemic, helping seniors live independently, rebuilding communities after disasters, and leading conservation and climate change efforts.

AmeriCorps members and AmeriCorps Seniors volunteers served at more than **200**locations across Hawaii, including schools, food banks, homeless shelters, health clinics, youth centers, veterans facilities, and other nonprofit and faith-based organizations. Through a unique public-private partnership, AmeriCorps and its partners generated more than **\$2.1 million** in outside resources from businesses, foundations, public agencies, and other sources in Hawaii last year. This local support strengthened community impact and increased the return on taxpayer dollars.

Our Programs and Initiatives

AmeriCorps State and National awards grants to organizations to engage individuals in sustained service to address local, regional, and national challenges. Thousands of opportunities exist in locations across the country to serve with nonprofits, schools, public agencies, tribes, and community and faith-based groups. Most AmeriCorps grant funding goes to Hawai'i Commission on National and Community Service, the Governor-appointed State Service Commission, which in turn awards grants to organizations to respond to local needs.

Public Health AmeriCorps supports the recruitment, training, and development of the next generation of public health leaders who will be ready to respond to the nation's health needs. In partnership with the Centers for Disease Control, Public Health AmeriCorps advances more equitable health outcomes, creates pathways to quality careers, and recruits members who reflect the communities they serve.

AmeriCorps VISTA places individuals with nonprofit organizations, public agencies, and tribal governments to expand reach and deepen impact in making sustainable change that alleviates the impact of poverty. Through fundraising, volunteer recruitment, program development, and more, AmeriCorps members gain experience and leadership skills that put them on track for a life of service in the public, private, or nonprofit sector.

AmeriCorps NCCC is a full-time, team-based, residential program for 18–26-year-olds. Whether building homes for families in need or accelerating our nation's capacity to respond to a crisis, AmeriCorps NCCC members engage in a variety of community identified projects during their service term, while developing leadership, teamwork, and professional skills. AmeriCorps NCCC FEMA Corps serves communities, in coordination with FEMA, through disaster preparedness, response, and recovery.

AmeriCorps Seniors Foster Grandparents provides grants to organizations to engage low-income Americans aged 55 and older in providing one-on-one mentoring and academic support to children with special or exceptional needs. In 2021, Foster Grandparents in Hawai'i served more than 20 young people with special needs.

AmeriCorps Senior Senior Companions provides grants to organizations to engage low-income Americans aged 55 and older in providing supportive, individualized services to help homebound seniors and other adults maintain their dignity and independence.

AmeriCorps Seniors RSVP provides grants to organizations to engage Americans aged 55 and older in tutoring and mentoring youth, responding to natural disasters, supporting veterans and their families, and meeting other critical needs.

Volunteer Generation Fund supports voluntary organizations and state service commissions in boosting the impact of volunteers in addressing critical community needs.

MLK Day of Service is observed each year on the third Monday in January. It is the only federal holiday designated as a national day of service to encourage all Americans to volunteer to deepen ties to communities, expand racial equity, and solidify service to others as a national commitment.

9/11 National Day of Service and Remembrance calls Americans across the country to volunteer in their local communities in tribute to the individuals lost and injured in the attacks, first responders, and the many who have risen in service to defend freedom since Sept. 11, 2001.

Department of Education

Of Hawaii's current \$2.18 billion dollar education budget, \$239 million or 11 percent of that funding is from the federal government. Most of those funds are allocated to Title 1 schools, special needs programs and school nutrition.

The U.S. DOE provides Hawai'i nearly \$52 million a year in Title 1 funding, helping more than 96,000 of our most vulnerable students with vital funding to hire teachers and support staff. Losing federal dollars would further exacerbate the educator shortages plaguing Hawai'i public schools, causing students' class sizes to balloon.

The federal education department also supports almost 20,000 Hawai'i students with special needs with nearly \$38 million in funding every year.

A group of 21 Attorneys General, including Hawai'i's AG, <u>sued the Trump administration</u> to block the dismantling of the federal education department, alleging the firing of 50% of its employees "incapacitates" the department's ability to compete its legally-required functions.

U.S. Sen. Mazie Hirono (D, HI) released a statement that said, "The Department of Education supports low-income students and students with disabilities, prevents discrimination in the classroom, and ensures access to afterschool and summer programs, while supporting important services like school lunch for kids in need."

"Donald Trump's cruel effort to gut the department from the inside out will wreak havoc on schools and communities across the country, leaving students, educators, and families paying the price," Hirono added.

As of May 12 the following is the status of the lawsuit as reported by Education Week:

On May 6, 2025 a federal judge halted the Trump administration's decision to <u>effectively cancel more than \$1 billion in K-12 education funding</u> for more than a dozen states—but left the door open for the U.S. Department of Education to again terminate the funding after giving states advance notice.

Judge Edgardo Ramos said in the May 6 order that sued along with the District of Columbia had shown sufficient reason to halt a <u>March 28 letter from Education Secretary Linda McMahon</u> abruptly announcing that the administration had moved up the due date for spending remaining pandemic relief funds.

<u>Ramos' order</u> prohibits the Education Department from enforcing or implementing the letter's cancellation of those spending extensions for the 16 states and the District of Columbia through the course of litigation or until a subsequent court order. The department also cannot modify those extensions for the states that sued to spend their pandemic dollars without providing at least 14 days' notice announcing a new deadline. His order doesn't apply to states that didn't participate in the lawsuit.

Grant Application Information

Here's how you can tell whether we've already published an application notice for a particular program or competition in the *Federal Register* and whether the dates we list in this Forecast of Funding Opportunities are actual or estimates:

If we have published the application notice, we will list the *Federal Register* (FR) volume and page number (e.g., 65 FR 53402) after the date in column two. The other dates for that program or competition (columns four and five) are actual (as opposed to estimated) dates.

If we do not follow the date in column two with an FR citation, it means that we have yet to publish the application notice, and the dates (columns, two, four, and five) are estimates only. The actual dates will appear in the official application notice for that program or competition in the *Federal Register*.

Date of Application Notice. In column two of the charts, we lists the actual or estimated date for publication of the application notice for a given program or competition.

Link to Notice. In column three of the charts, after its publication in the *Federal Register*, we will provide a link to the application notice for a given program or competition.

Electronic Grant Applications. Applications may be submitted electronically, for certain programs listed in the Forecast, through the Grants Management System (G5: www.q5.gov) or through Grants.gov. The requirements and instructions for submitting applications electronically under the program identified will appear in the *Federal Register* in the application notice for these programs or competitions. It is important to note that, if a competition is using Grants.gov, it will not be using G5 and vice versa. As part of doing business with the Federal Government, applicants must have an active registration with SAM (www.SAM.gov). Therefore, we strongly recommend that you create a SAM account now (or update your account if you already have an existing one) before the application package becomes available so that once the package is posted, your registration will be complete.

Contact Information

Program Contact Person. In column seven of the charts, we list the name, e-mail address, fax, and telephone numbers of the person or persons to contact for obtaining an application or further information about the programs listed. We also include this information in the actual application notice for that program.

For Users of TDD or FIRS. If you use a telecommunications device for the deaf (TDD), you may call the TDD number, if any, listed in the individual application notice. If a TDD number is not listed for a given program, individuals who use a TDD may call the Federal Information Relay Service (FIRS) at 1-800-877-8339.

Fiscal Information

Available Funds. The programs and funding amounts listed in this document are based on the Secretary's best estimates at this time. The Secretary is providing this document in order to give potential applicants adequate time to prepare applications. Potential applicants should note, however, that the Department may cancel some of the competitions listed in this document and may announce some new competitions not listed in this document.

Estimated Average Size of Awards and Number of Awards. Except for programs and competitions administered by the Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services (OSERS), column six lists estimated average size and number of awards. The amounts and numbers referenced in this column are advisory and represent the Secretary's best estimates at this time. The average size of an award is the estimate for a single-year project or for the first budget period of a multi-year project. In the application package for an individual program or competition, applicants will receive information about the amount the Secretary intends to make available for each year of a multi-year project.

In the case of programs and competitions administered by the principal components of OSERS, the charts differ with regard to the average size of awards. For programs and competitions of this office, column six of the charts

lists the average or estimated maximum size of the awards per year. Applicants will receive further information about funding amounts in the application packages for the individual programs.

Introduction

The Office of Management and Budget (OMB) made significant updates to 2 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) 200 which establishes administrative requirements, cost principles, and audit requirements for all Federal financial assistance. The updates, known as the Uniform Grants Guidance 2024 Revision, apply to projects that start on or after October 1, 2024. Current recipients should work with their Grant Specialists and Project Officers to understand when and if their current projects are affected. recipients should work with their Grant Specialists and Project Officers to understand when and if their current projects are affected.

You should be aware of the changes and how they could affect your project.

Benefits

The updated guidance benefits applicants and recipients in many ways.

- Guidance is written in plain language to clarify concepts and terms that have been subject to multiple interpretations.
- Grant announcements—also known as Notices of Funding Opportunity (NOFOs)—are streamlined and shortened.
- Application requirements for new Federal financial assistance are simplified.
- Administrative burdens on applicants and recipients are reduced.

Flexibility for community engagement-related activities is increased.

Key Changes

The following highlights call attention to some of the most significant changes in each subpart of 2 CFR 200.

§ 200.1 Definitions.

These are the definitions for terms used in this part. Different definitions may be found in Federal statutes or regulations that apply more specifically to particular programs or activities. These definitions could be supplemented by additional instructional information provided in governmentwide standard information collections. For purposes of this part, the following definitions apply:

Acronyms and Definitions (Subpart A (Sections 200.0 -200.1)) and General Provisions (Subpart B (Sections 200.100-200.113))

- The term "recipient or subrecipient" replaces "non-federal entity" globally except when non-federal entity refers to statutory provisions.
- An applicant, recipient, or subrecipient is now required to promptly disclose when it has "credible evidence" of violations of Federal criminal law involving fraud, conflict of interest, bribery, or gratuity violations.



Pre-Award (Subpart C (Sections 200.200-200.217))

- Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) announcements use a streamlined template.
- Use of plain language eliminates jargon and ensures consistent use of terms.
- Programs may translate NOFOs to languages other than English.
- Organizations can more easily identify their eligibility for funding opportunities.
- Recipients and subrecipients must now inform employees in writing of whistleblower rights and protections.



Post-Award (Subpart D (Sections 200.300-200.346))

- Recipients and subrecipients must take reasonable cybersecurity and other measures to safeguard sensitive information.
- Similar to States, Tribes must follow the same policies and procedures used for procurements made with non-Federal funds when they conduct procurement transactions under a Federal financial assistance agreement.
- The maximum amount for fixed amount subawards is \$500,000 (changed from \$250,000);
 fixed amount subawards still require approval from EPA's Office of Grants and
 Debarment.
- The maximum fair market value for equipment that may be retained, sold, or otherwise disposed of with no further responsibility to EPA or a pass-through entity is \$10,000 (increased from \$5,000).
- Recipients are required to sell at the end of the grant period unused supplies that exceed an aggregate value of \$10,000.
- Three types of procurement are clarified: informal procurement methods (for micro-purchases and simplified acquisitions); formal procurement methods (through sealed bids or proposals); and noncompetitive procurement methods.
- Recipients have additional responsibilities when closing a grant.
- EPA must report a recipient's non-compliance in SAM.gov, including failure to submit all final reports.



Cost Principles (Subpart E (Sections 200.400-200.476))

- The prior approval requirement is removed for several cost categories, including participant support costs.
- The de minimis indirect cost rate percentage is 15% (increased from 10%).

- The threshold for defining equipment and other capital expenditures is \$10,000 (increased from \$5,000).
- Allowable organization costs now include costs related to data (for example, gathering, managing, publishing, using, etc.) and evaluation (for example, reviewing evidence, conducting evaluations, sharing results, etc.).
- Closeout costs and post-closeout adjustments and continuing responsibilities are revised.



Audit Requirements (Subpart F (Sections 200.500-200.521))

• The threshold value for Single Audits is \$1,000,000 (increased from \$750,000).

Department of Homeland Security



On Jan. 20, President Donald Trump working with Secretary Kristi Noem <u>signed an executive order</u> <u>requiring Noem</u> to "review and, if appropriate, audit all contracts, grants, or other agreements providing Federal funding to nongovernmental organizations supporting or providing services, either directly or indirectly, to removable or illegal aliens."

The order instructed Noem to suspend payments pending the results of the agencywide review and terminate "all such agreements determined to be in violation of law or to be sources of waste, fraud, or abuse."

On January 28, 2025 Secretary Noem issued a memorandum freezing "all Department grant disbursements and assessments of grant applications that: (a) go to nonprofit organizations or for which nonprofit organizations are eligible, and (b) touch in any way on immigration."

As of June 2025 the DHS website is undergoing an agency-wide update and all major grant programs for local governments and non-profits are in flux.

DHS Components and Directorates Issuing Financial Assistance

Eight DHS Components and Directorates manage DHS financial assistance programs:

- Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction Office (CWMD)
- Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA)
- Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)
- Science and Technology Directorate (S&T)
- <u>U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services</u> (USCIS)
- <u>U.S. Coast Guard</u> (USCG)
- U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE)
- <u>U.S. Secret Service</u> (USSS)

FEMA manages 70% of the DHS financial assistance programs and awards 98% of the DHS financial assistance funding through disaster and non-disaster grants, cooperative agreements, loans, direct payments, and flood insurance.

Financial Assistance Policy and Oversight (FAPO)

The DHS Office of Chief Financial Officer's (OCFO) Financial Assistance Policy and Oversight (FAPO) Division leads the Department's Financial Assistance Line of Business (FALoB) by providing oversight of DHS financial assistance programs. FAPO serves as the central financial assistance resource for all DHS Component Program Offices (POs) and Financial Awarding Offices (FAOs). FAPO develops and implements policy, conducts oversight reviews, and tracks and reports financial assistance activities throughout the financial assistance lifecycle phases: pre-award, award, post award, and closeout; as well as internal controls.

Apply for Financial Assistance on Grants.gov

<u>Grants.gov</u> is the source to find and apply for federal financial assistance. DHS uses Grants.gov to post notices of funding opportunity (NOFOs). There is a <u>registration process</u> for Grants.gov that may take up to three weeks to complete. Grants.gov is the federal wide system utilized by government agencies. Registering with Grants.gov allows applicants to apply for financial assistance opportunities for all federal agencies.

Financial Assistance Resources

- <u>Assistance Listings</u> (ALs) are detailed public descriptions of federal programs that provide grants, loans, scholarships, insurance, and other types of assistance awards. You may browse assistance listings across all government agencies to learn about potential funding sources.
- <u>DHS Standard Terms and Conditions</u> are the legal requirements imposed on a financial
 assistance award, whether based on regulation, policy or other document referenced in the
 award, or specified in the notice of award (NOA) document itself. The NOA may include both
 standard and special conditions that are considered necessary to attain the award's
 objectives, facilitate post-award administration, or otherwise protect the Federal Government's
 interests.

The applicable DHS Standard Terms and Conditions for grants, cooperative agreements, fixed amount awards, and other types of federal financial assistance are based on the fiscal year in which the financial assistance award was funded.

• <u>Title 2, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 200</u>, "Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards." 2 CFR Part 200, or Uniform Guidance, is the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) guidance to federal agencies on government-wide policies and procedures for the award and administration of federal financial assistance. Recent revisions to the Uniform Guidance will take effect on all new federal awards made on or after October 1, 2024.

- Strengthen your home. Use fire resistant materials to build, renovate or make repairs. Create a fire-resistant zone that is free of leaves, debris or flammable materials for at least 30 feet away from your home if possible.



On March 31, 2025 The Institute of Museum and Library Services placed its entire staff on administrative leave. Approximately 70 employees are no longer available to assist libraries and museums across the country. President Trump named Keith E. Sonderling — the deputy secretary of labor —as the new acting director of IMLS.

According to a statement from AFGE Local 3403, which represents IMLS workers, the agency's staff was notified by email about being placed on paid administrative leave for up to 90 days, after a "brief meeting between DOGE staff and IMLS leadership." Employees had to turn in government property, and email accounts were disabled.

IMLS awarded \$266 million in grants and research last year.

It remains unclear whether funding for existing grantees will continue, and whether new grants will be available in the future.



State Administering Agencies

State Administering Agencies (SAAs) conduct coordinated and transparent strategic planning and implement structural reforms that improve the administration of justice, while saving taxpayer money. There are 56 agencies in all 50 states and territories, and Washington DC. Visit the SAA Directory for agency contact information and websites, and contact information agency heads, JAG contacts and SAC Directors.

Most SAAs are a component of the Governor's (or Mayor's) office; a free-standing criminal justice planning entity or a division of the state department of public safety. In addition to location, the mission, vision and strategic focus of an SAA is often defined by state statutes. Due to differences in location, formula grants administered, research capacity and leadership selection processes, SAAs are a diverse group of government agencies with differing capacities, perspectives, missions and priorities.

The Role of the SAA

With a structure and process that varies by state, these agencies use strategic planning to analyze crime trends, evaluate the priorities of all segments of the criminal justice system, set out a plan for reducing crime and victimization and guide the use of the grant funds.

Furthermore, SAAs, in partnership with the Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA), design, replicate and implement evidence-based programs and practices that target the needs identified in their strategic plans, incorporate rigorous research, measure performance, and provide an honest assessment of success or failure. In many states, the SAAs have established training centers that help their local partners develop and deploy evidence-based practices. (See our *From Policy to Practice* video series for information about state resources for supporting implementation of EBPs).

Many innovative criminal justice practices started with funding from the Edward Memorial Justice Assistane Grant (Byrne JAG) Program, the primary provider of federal criminal justice funding to state and local jurisdictions. JAG-funded programs have been replicated nationwide. These include drug courts, methamphetamine lab reduction, anti-gang strategies, reentry programs and information sharing protocols. CPJAD serves as the central agency to provide the Attorney General, the chief law enforcement officer of Hawaii, with the information and resources needed to address crime and crime prevention. CPJAD accomplishes this by:

- Researching crime issues and reporting comprehensive crime statistics for the state;
- Utilizing federal and state funds and non-financial resources to address crime problems and criminal justice system issues;
- Planning, developing, and implementing education and crime prevention programs to promote community involvement in crime prevention efforts;
- Developing and maintaining a computerized juvenile offender information system.
- Assisting in locating, recovering, and reuniting missing children and runaways with their families.
- Supporting the Hawaii Sexual Assault Response and Training program and the statewide standards related to the sexual assault evidence collection kit.

This enables the Attorney General to facilitate and coordinate efforts to improve the criminal justice system and to encourage community partnerships in addressing crime.

Our mission is to assist the criminal justice system agencies to improve service delivery and to promote the involvement of communities in the prevention of crime.

Employment and Training (ETA): ETA Administers financial assistance programs pursuant to the Workforce Investment Act (WIA), administering State formula grant programs for youth, adults and dislocated workers, national emergency grants for workers affected by mass layoffs, plant closures, and disasters; grant programs for workers with disabilities, Indians and Native Americans, and for migrant and seasonal farmworkers. ETA also administers grant programs for older American workers, apprenticeship programs, Trade Adjustment Assistance (TAA) programs, and assistance for research and development of workforce programs. In addition, ETA is responsible for the operation and maintenance of a national system of public employment service offices and for the national unemployment insurance program.

Veterans' Employment and Training Service

Veterans' Employment and Training (VETS): provides special employment and training assistance for veterans through the <u>Disabled Veterans' Outreach Program (DVOP) Solicitation for Grant Applications</u>; the Local Veterans' Employment Representative Program (LVER); <u>Veterans' Workforce Investment</u> <u>Program (VWIP)</u>; <u>elaws Advisor on veterans' employment and reemployment rights</u>; and the <u>Homeless Veterans Reintegration Project (HVRP)</u>. VETS grants are awarded by the <u>OASAM grant office</u>.

Occupational Health and Safety Administration

Occupational Safety and Health (OSHA): provides grants to non-profit organizations to provide training, educational services, and technical assistance; assistance to states to administer and enforce state programs; assistance to states to provide occupational safety and health technical assistance and consultant services. (Open grants in the Spring of 2025 are not currently posted)

Mine Safety and Health Administration

Mine Safety and Health (MSHA): provides grants for research, education and training programs to ensure an adequate and competent staff of trained inspectors; and assistance for establishing or improving State mine health and safety programs through technical assistance.

- Office of Disability Employment Policy (ODEP): The Office of Disability Employment Policy awards competitive grants establishing short-term pilot and technical assistance projects designed to identify, develop, test, evaluate, and disseminate policies to increase employment by expanding access to training, education, employment supports, assistive and systems technology, integrated employment, entrepreneurial development, and small business opportunities for adults and youth with disabilities. - Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS): provides project grants (cooperative agreements) and the

 compensation and working conditions; data on employment projections.

National Endowment for the Arts

The National Endowment for the Arts awards grants to nonprofit organizations, creative writers and translators, state arts agencies, and regional arts organizations in support of arts projects across the country.

On May 6, 2025 it was reported that The Trump Administration has started canceling National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) grants. According to public reports, hundreds of arts groups of various sizes across the U.S. received emails notifying them of the withdrawal and termination of their grants. The updates, which came by email address, occurred shortly after President Trump proposed eliminating the agency entirely from the federal budget.

"The NEA is updating its grantmaking policy priorities to focus funding on projects that reflect the nation's rich artistic heritage and creativity as prioritized by the President," the email, several copies of which have been shared with NPR, stated in part. "Consequently, we are terminating awards that fall outside these new priorities." The email includes a line saying the recipient can appeal the decision within seven days.

The email states President Trump's priorities as being: "Projects that elevate the Nation's HBCUs and Hispanic Serving Institutions, celebrate the 250th anniversary of American independence, foster Al competency, empower houses of worship to serve communities, assist with disaster recovery, foster skilled trade jobs, make America healthy again, support the military and veterans, support Tribal communities, make the District of Columbia safe and beautiful, and support the economic development of Asian American communities."

The National Endowment for the Arts is among a group of "small agency eliminations" proposed by the Trump administration's <u>2026 Discretionary Budget Request</u>, alongside the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Institute of Museum and Library Services. "The Budget includes the elimination of, or the elimination of Federal funding for, the following small agencies — consistent with the President's efforts to decrease the size of the Federal Government to enhance accountability, reduce waste, and reduce unnecessary governmental entities. Past Trump administration budgets have also supported these eliminations. Remaining funds account for costs of orderly shutdowns," the budget request states.

Earlier this year several arts agencies from across the country sued NEA over new requirements following the Presidential Executive Order barring the use of federal funds for the "promotion of gender ideology". The lawsuit was filed in late February.

National Endowment for the Humanities

The National Endowment for the Humanities is in a state of flux similar to the National Endowment for the Arts and the Institute for Museum and Library Services.

State Humanities Councils have received letters from the Endowment stating grants were being terminated because the NEH is "repurposing its funding allocations in a new direction in furtherance of President Trump's agenda." The legal basis for the cancellations remains unclear. Observers have noted that the creation and funding of state humanities councils was specifically mandated in the legislation passed by Congress.

NEH issued the following directive via press release on April 24, 2025:

"An Update on NEH Funding Priorities and the Agency's Recent Implementation of Trump Administration Executive Orders"

In recent weeks the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) has taken several internal operational steps to improve efficiency, eliminate offices that are not essential to fulfilling its statutory requirements, and to return to being a responsible steward of taxpayer funds.

NEH has also taken programmatic steps to ensure that all future awards will, among other things, be merit-based, awarded to projects that do not promote extreme ideologies based upon race or gender, and that help to instill an understanding of the founding principles and ideals that make America an exceptional country.

For these reasons, NEH is releasing the following statement of its priorities along with answers that are relevant to questions that the public may have.

Statement on NEH Priorities

Founded in 1965, the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) is a grant-making agency of the U.S. government dedicated to supporting exemplary humanities research and programming in service of the American people. It does so by investing in the most meritorious proposals for the advancement and dissemination of humanities learning.

As set forth in <u>NEH's enabling legislation</u>, the humanities include the study of modern and classical languages, linguistics, literature, history, jurisprudence, philosophy, archaeology, comparative religion, ethics, the history of the arts, and those aspects of the social sciences which have humanistic content and use humanistic methods, as well as other areas.

To bring the wisdom of the humanities to all Americans, NEH supports research projects that advance humanistic learning, preservation projects that ensure access to significant humanities resources, education projects that strengthen teaching in the humanities, and public programing that conveys the best of the humanities to all Americans.

Moving forward, NEH is especially interested in projects on the nation's semiquincentennial and U.S. history more generally. In addition, the agency will be more finely attuned to its statutory responsibility that "funding should contribute to public support and confidence in the use of taxpayer funds."

As per longstanding agency policy, NEH-supported projects must not promote a particular political, religious, or ideological point of view and must not engage in political or social advocacy. NEH-supported projects should not preference some groups at the expense of others and should ultimately support public purposes.

The principles of intellectual significance, merit, competition, and equal opportunity lie at the heart of NEH's mission.

Frequently Asked Questions

1. Why is NEH refocusing its priorities?

At the start of an administration, NEH has always established new initiatives within the policy context set forth by Congress, the Executive Branch, and the head of the agency. Currently, NEH is especially encouraging projects related to the nation's semiquincentennial and American exceptionalism. In addition, NEH has recommitted itself to ensuring that its funding, as required by statute, contributes to public confidence in how it expends taxpayer funds.

2. Why is NEH cancelling awards?

All federal grantmaking agencies, including NEH, must ensure that taxpayer dollars are spent effectively and are consistent with each agency's mission. This requires that NEH regularly evaluate its funding priorities within the policy framework established by Congress, the Administration, and the head of NEH. Awards and programming must align with these priorities.

3. What types of awards are being cancelled?

In collaboration with the Administration, NEH has cancelled awards that are at variance with agency priorities, including but not limited to those on diversity, equity, and inclusion (or DEI) and environmental justice, as well as awards that may not inspire public confidence in the use of taxpayer funds.

4. Why has NEH added guidance to its NOFOs on the "promotion of gender ideology," "environmental justice initiatives or activities," "discriminatory equity ideology," and DEI/DEIA?

As a federal agency, NEH is required to comply with all relevant Executive Orders issued by the Administration. NEH updated the Funding Restrictions section of its NOFOs to comply with several recent Executive Orders, including "Ending Radical and Wasteful Government DEI Programs and Preferencing," "Defending Women from Gender Ideology Extremism and Restoring Biological Truth to the Federal Government," and "Ending Radical Indoctrination in K-12 Schooling." You can learn more about these Executive Orders by visiting the White House's <u>Presidential Actions webpage</u>.

NEH will promptly comply with all relevant Executive Orders and court actions.

5. How will NEH decide whether a proposed project contravenes any of the Administration's recent Executive Orders, such as "Ending Radical and Wasteful Government DEI Programs and Preferencing" and "Defending Women from Gender Ideology Extremism and Restoring Biological Truth to the Federal Government"?

As per standard practice, NEH peer reviewers evaluate an application based on the program's published Review Criteria. At a later point in the process, NEH staff and leadership, along with the agency's General Counsel, will consider, as needed, whether an award of federal funds to a specific application might violate the new guidelines. In accordance with NEH's authorizing legislation, the NEH Chairman will make all final funding decisions about which applications will receive public support.

6. Does the addition of the new guidance on gender ideology and environmental justice mean that NEH will not fund projects on, for example, the suffragist movement or a history of conservation policies in the United States?

No, not necessarily. The restrictions only apply to the categories mentioned in the relevant Executive Orders. We encourage you to read the relevant Executive Orders and consider whether your project's topic—jointly with its goals, methodology, activities, and intended audience—seems allowable.

7. Can I still work with or apply from Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs)?

Yes, applications from and collaborations with MSIs are encouraged.

8. Is NEH still accepting applications with a focus on countries, regions, cultures, or literatures other than that of the United States and Europe?

In honor of the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, NEH is especially interested in projects with a focus on American history and the nation's founding. Yet, NEH continues to accept (and fund) applications in all areas of the humanities as defined by NEH's statute. National Science Foundation



NSF chief management officer Micah Cheatham informed the staff that the agency will be undergoing a drastic restructuring. The changes would include dissolving the agency's divisional structure, firing some staff, and reducing the number of scientific experts the NSF relies on to help manage its programs. But a district <u>court ruling</u> handed down just hours after Cheatham sent the memo put many of the planned changes on hold until at least May 23.

On top of internal job cuts and reorganizations, the agency continues to eliminate grants. Since April 11, it has canceled over 1,400 awards representing \$1 billion in committed funds. The agency has also <u>frozen all funding actions</u> and <u>implemented a 15% cap</u> on the rate at which it reimburses institutions for indirect research costs.

In Mid-April the NSF issued a Statement of NSF Priorities. In addition, NSF employees

Statement of NSF priorities

April 18, 2025

The U.S. National Science Foundation (NSF) was established in 1950 to promote the progress of science, advance the national health, prosperity and welfare, and secure the national defense. It does this by investing in the most promising ideas and people across all fields of science and engineering (S&E). NSF priorities are grounded in the mission of the agency and modulated by statutory directives and administration priorities.

NSF uses two statutory criteria to ensure that every award has the potential to advance new knowledge (Intellectual Merit) with maximum impact on the Nation and its people (Broader Impacts). NSF investments unleash groundbreaking discoveries, translational solutions and expand participation in STEM. These efforts strengthen our domestic workforce to fuel economic prosperity, national security, and global S&E competitiveness.

The principles of merit, competition, equal opportunity, and excellence are the bedrock of the NSF mission. NSF continues to review all projects using Intellectual Merit and Broader Impacts criteria.

NSF's broadening participation activities, including activities undertaken in fulfillment of the Broader Impacts criterion, and research on broadening participation, must aim to create opportunities for all Americans everywhere.

These efforts should not preference some groups at the expense of others, or directly/indirectly exclude individuals or groups. Research projects with more narrow impact limited to subgroups of people based on protected class or characteristics do not effectuate NSF priorities.

NSF will continue to support research with the goal of understanding or addressing participation in STEM, in accordance with all applicable statutes and mandates, with the core goal of creating opportunities for all Americans.

NSF will continue to support basic and use-inspired research in S&E fields that focus on protected characteristics when doing so is intrinsic to the research question and is aligned with Agency priorities.

1. Why is NSF terminating awards?

All federal agencies that support research and development (R&D), including NSF, must ensure that taxpayer dollars are spent in the most efficient way possible consistent with each agency's mission. This requires that NSF regularly evaluate its research priorities within the policy framework established by Congress, the Administration and the Director of NSF. Awards and funding opportunities that do not align with these priorities cannot be funded.

2. Why is NSF changing its priorities?

NSF is continuing to prioritize cutting-edge discovery science and engineering (S&E) research, advancing technology and innovation, and creating opportunities for all Americans in every

region of the Nation. NSF has always established priorities within the policy context set forth by Congress, the Administration and the Director of NSF, and it continues to do so.

3. What types of awards are being terminated?

Awards that are not aligned with NSF's priorities have been terminated, including but not limited to those on diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) and misinformation/disinformation.

4. Can I still propose broadening participation activities (e.g., outreach) in fulfillment of the Broader Impacts criterion?

Investigators should prioritize the first six broader impacts goals as <u>defined by the America</u> <u>COMPETES Reauthorization Act of 2010</u>. Investigators wishing to address goal seven — expanding participation in STEM for women and underrepresented groups — must ensure that all outreach, recruitment, or participatory activities in NSF projects are open and available to all Americans. Investigators may conduct these types of engagement activities to individuals, institutions, groups, or communities based on protected characteristics only as part of broad engagement activities. Investigators may also expand participation in STEM based on non-protected characteristics, including but not limited to institutional type, geography, socioeconomic status, and career stage. However, engagement activities aimed at these characteristics cannot indirectly preference or exclude individuals or groups based on protected characteristics.

5. Will NSF consider proposals directed to a legally mandated NSF program/funding opportunity?

NSF will continue to operate programs that contain elements of broadening participation for individuals based on protected characteristics that are explicitly established in law and prioritized in NSF appropriations language. The research and broader impacts activities proposed in response to these programs should align with the relevant statutory language and aim to generate knowledge broadly impactful to Americans from all backgrounds and regions in the country.

Projects submitted to legally mandated broadening participation programs must not directly or indirectly preference or exclude any Americans on the basis of protected characteristics. Projects that have limited impact or rely on DEI frameworks or advocacy do not effectuate NSF priorities.

6. What about the court order that says you cannot withhold funding due to the Executive Orders (EOs)? Isn't NSF in violation of that?

No. NSF has continued to fund new awards and support existing awards that are in alignment with NSF priorities.

7. What are the protected and non-protected characteristics?

Protected characteristics are those contained in relevant laws, such as but not limited to, the Equal Protection Clause of the Constitution and Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

8. There are still gaps in the achievements of certain groups of people. Can we still research those?

NSF will continue to fund projects that rate highly using our Intellectual Merit and Broader Impacts review criteria in high priority S&E areas. Projects that aim to create more opportunities for more people in every region of the country to participate in science and technology remain an important part of NSF's mission.

NSF will continue to operate legally mandated programs that aim to expand participation in STEM for individuals of protected characteristics so long as the projects submitted to these programs do not preference or limit participation based on these protected characteristics.

9. Can I research individuals or groups based on protected characteristics in other areas of S&E?

Yes. Researchers may recruit or study individuals based on protected characteristics when doing so is (1) intrinsic to the research question (e.g., research on human physiology), (2) not focused on broadening participation in STEM on the basis of protected characteristics, and (3) aimed to fill an important gap in S&E knowledge. For example, research on technology to assist individuals with disabilities may be supported even when the research subject recruitment is limited to those with disabilities.

10. Is there a list of words I should be avoiding?

There is not a list of words. Investigators should focus on Intellectual Merit and Broader Impacts for proposals in a way that is consistent with NSF priorities.

11. Can I still work with Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs)?

Yes. Collaboration and partnerships between and among various types of institutions of higher education (IHEs) as well as cross-sector partnerships involving government, academia, and the private sector remain a top priority.

12. Are centers impacted? What about facilities that have DEI plans, will those be impacted?

The NSF guidance on broadening participation applies to all current and future NSF awards.

13. Are you still funding research on misinformation/disinformation?

Per the <u>Presidential Action</u> announced January 20, 2025, NSF will not prioritize research proposals that engage in or facilitate any conduct that would unconstitutionally abridge the free speech of any American citizen. NSF will not support research with the goal of combating "misinformation," "disinformation," and "malinformation" that could be used to infringe on the constitutionally protected speech rights of American citizens across the United States in a manner that advances a preferred narrative about significant matters of public debate.

14. Can costs be reimbursed prior to the award termination date?

Yes. Costs may be reimbursed to an NSF award up to and including the award termination date, provided they are allowable, allocable, and reasonable under the sections on Allowable Costs and Termination in your award terms and conditions (e.g., sections 11 and 33 in GC-1). Per the

Termination section of your award's terms and conditions (GC-1 section 33(e)) you must submit the total of costs that were incurred prior to the termination but not drawn down in ACM\$ to dgafinalcosts@nsf.gov no later than 30 calendar days after the award termination date.

15. UPDATED: What are the requirements for project reports if my award has been terminated?

Normal procedures specified in the <u>Proposal and Award Policies and Procedures Guide</u> (PAPPG) Chapter VII.D apply. Any annual reports must be submitted on time. The final annual project report must be submitted in <u>Research.gov</u> no later than 120 days after the end date of the award. Principal investigators (PIs) will continue to receive notifications on the due dates for all required reports.

16. My award was terminated on the basis that it "no longer effectuates the program goals or agency priorities." Can I appeal or seek alternative dispute resolution?

Terminations of awards on the basis that they no longer effectuate program goals or agency priorities are the final agency decision and are not appealable to NSF. In these instances, NSF does not allege a deficiency occurred (e.g., noncompliance with award terms and conditions or research misconduct of the awardee). Because there are no allegations of deficiencies by the awardee to dispute, there are no grounds for agency appeal. Similarly, alternative dispute resolution is not available where terminations were based on effectuation of program goals or agency priorities.

17. Is NSF changing its policy regarding the indirect cost rate associated with NSF awards?

Yes. Effective May 5, 2025, NSF is applying a standard indirect cost rate not to exceed 15% to all grants and cooperative agreements awarded to Institutions of Higher Education — as defined in 20 USC 1001 — for which indirect costs are allowable. This policy does not apply retroactively to existing awards. For more details, see the new NSF indirect cost policy.

Loans of \$50,000 or less to help businesses and certain non-profit childcare centers. Microloans are provided by intermediary lenders.



Loans guaranteed by SBA range from small to large and can be used for most business purposes, including long-term fixed assets and operating capital. Some loan programs set restrictions on how you can use the funds, so check with an SBA-approved lender when requesting a loan. Your lender can match you with the right loan for your business needs.

Eligibility requirements


Lenders and loan programs have unique eligibility requirements. In general, eligibility is based on what a business does to receive its income, the character of its ownership, and where the business operates. Normally, businesses must meet SBA <u>size standards</u>, be able to repay, and have a sound business purpose. Even those with bad credit may qualify for startup funding. The lender will provide you with a full list of eligibility requirements for your loan.



The business's credit must be sound enough to assure loan repayment.

Exhaust financing options



The requested loan is unavailable on reasonable terms from non-government sources.

Stay safe

Protect yourself from predatory lenders by looking for warning signs. Some lenders impose unfair and abusive terms on borrowers through deception and coercion. Watch out for interest rates that are significantly higher than competitors' rates, or fees that are more than 5% of the loan value. Make sure the lender discloses the annual percentage rate and full payment schedule. A lender should never ask you to lie on paperwork or leave signature boxes blank. Don't get pressured into taking a loan. Survey competing offers and consider speaking with a financial planner, accountant, or attorney before signing for your next loan.

Loans for exporters

Most U.S. banks view loans for exporters as risky. This can make it harder for you to get loans for things like day-to-day operations, advance orders with suppliers, and debt refinancing. That's why SBA created programs to make it easier for U.S. small businesses to get export loans.

SBA's <u>7(j) Management and Technical Assistance Program</u> is for capable small businesses in Regions I - X interested in providing management and technical assistance and guidance to eligible small businesses.

What you need to know about small business grants

- SBA does not provide grants for starting and expanding a business.
- SBA provides grants to nonprofit, Resource Partners, and educational organizations that support entrepreneurship through counseling and training programs.
- SBA only communicates from email addresses ending in **@sba.gov**. If you are being contacted by someone claiming to be from SBA who is not using an official SBA email address, you should suspect <u>fraud and report it</u>.



Department of Transportation

The Department of Transportation grant programs are currently in flux. While some notices have been issued, the factors around awards have been modified. A leaked policy memo from leadership at USDOT will add a new layer of extra-legal review of all awarded competitive grant projects without fully signed federal funding obligations, calling for bicycle infrastructure, green infrastructure, and EV chargers to be cut from projects. The memo specifically applies to competitive grants that have not yet completed grant agreements or obligated the funding, including those that have only been

partially obligated. Projects with existing and executed grant agreements are not subject to additional review, but any new federal dollars made out to those projects would be. DOT has been tasked with rescinding, canceling and revoking all orders, rules, funding agreements and policies enacted during the Biden Administration that reference topics such as climate change, greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions, racial equity, gender identity, DEI goals, environmental justice or the Justice40 Initiative. The effect of these directives:

- Focus on Family and Community Impact: Instead of focusing on broader environmental and social equity concerns, DOT policies will now prioritize impacts on families and local communities. This means that infrastructure projects will be evaluated based on factors such as noise reduction, water and soil quality, and economic stability rather than climate or equity goals. Communities with marriage and birth rates higher than the national average will receive higher preference for awards.
- Restrictions on Federal Funding for Local Political Objectives: DOT grants, loans and contracts must now serve a clear federal interest and cannot be used to advance projects that serve purely local political goals. This could lead to the defunding of initiatives that prioritize local political or social priorities over national economic and infrastructure objectives.
- Co-Funding and Buy America Requirements: Moving forward, projects must demonstrate strong local financial commitment and adhere to Buy America provisions. DOT will also prioritize project awards that include utilizing user-pay modules. Federal funding will no longer be available for projects that rely on indefinite government support for future maintenance or expansion.
- Compliance with Federal Immigration Enforcement: Communities are required to cooperate with federal immigration enforcement in order to qualify for DOT funding. A <u>similar effort</u> was put forth by the Trump Administration in 2017 but was ultimately rejected by the courts.

At the same time, DOT has updated the Department's information providing a federal funding toolkit.

Grants

A grant is one of many different forms of financial assistance. A grant is a way the government funds projects to provide public services and stimulate the economy.

If completed in compliance with award terms, grants do not have to be repaid to the government.

In the case of USDOT grants or construction grants, federal grants provide funding that is awarded through reimbursable payments.

Grants support critical recovery initiatives, innovative research, and many other programs listed in the <u>Federal assistance listings</u>. The intent of most grants is to fund projects that will benefit specific parts of the population or the community as a whole.

Advantages of Grant Funding

- Grant funding is generally non-repayable once awarded, and project sponsors thus avoid incurring debt or interest expenses if completed successfully.
- In some cases, grants may be a lower-risk way of obtaining assistance compared to loan financing, without potentially impacting credit ratings and assets.

What Makes a Grant "Competitive"?



Competitive grants are grants that USDOT awards to eligible applicants usually through a competitive selection process. Eligible applicants vary based on the specific grant program but may include state, Tribal and local governments, transit providers, universities, research institutions, law enforcement agencies, nonprofit organizations, and others.

USDOT administers its competitive grant programs through its operating administrations (OAs or "modes"). Each mode solicits applications and selects projects based on program and applicant eligibility, evaluation criteria, and Departmental or program priorities, therefore making it "competitive".

Competitive grants also differ from **block grants** and **categorical grants**, which are usually distributed as a "pot" to recipients for specific services (the latter type with many restrictions). Formula grants, block grants, and categorical grants are all considered **non-competitive** funding sources. Since competitive grants are not awarded to every applicant, they are considered competitive compared to these other types of federal grants.

This toolkit focuses on competitive grant programs only but also provides resources for applicants to explore other funding sources, both within and outside of USDOT.

Non-Competitive Funding Opportunities: Formula Grants



The most common non-competitive opportunities offered by federal agencies are **formula grants**, which distribute funds to every recipient in a group (such as all 50 states) to accomplish the same purpose. These may also be known as federal-aid funds or formula funds.

Formula grants are not competitive because the funding amount for each recipient is calculated based on specific parameters set by Congress, such as state population.

USDOT distributes these formula funds to states, federally recognized Tribal recipients, and transit agencies as primary recipients. When the funds are further allocated to local entities, the primary grant recipient acts as a **pass-through entity** for the local entity, who becomes a **subrecipient** for the grant.

Formula Grant Examples

Examples of formula grants include the <u>Formula Grants for Rural Areas</u> (Section 5311), <u>Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities</u> (Section 5310), and <u>Grants for Buses and Bus Facilities Formula Program</u> (Section 5339[a]) issued by the USDOT Federal Transit Administration (FTA).

How Federal Grants Are Announced

Federal grant opportunities are announced during different phases of the grant cycle via a publicly available document that goes by one of the following names:

- Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO)
- Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA)
- Funding Opportunity Announcement (FOA)

Opportunities are frequently announced via <u>USDOT Press Releases</u>, can often be found on the <u>Federal Register under the USDOT Notices</u>, are posted on agency websites, and are made available for access on <u>Grants.gov</u>.

Where Does Grant Money Come From?

Congress, the Legislative Branch of government (elected by citizens), proposes appropriations of taxpayer funds for government functions, including for federal agencies in the Executive Branch of government (like USDOT). The President (chosen through the electors of the electoral college voted by the citizens) must then sign these appropriations bills into law (effectively agreeing with Congress) before these funds are made available to agencies. Agencies then distribute funding through grant programs.

In 2021, members from both major Congressional parties came together to pass the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA), more commonly called the <u>Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL)</u>, signed by President Biden, which provided \$1.2 trillion for transportation and infrastructure. Of that total, \$550 billion is going toward new federal investments in America's infrastructure.

This new funding has allowed USDOT and other federal agencies to award new competitive grants for funding transportation infrastructure improvements, many of which are outlined here in the *Grant Applicant Toolkit*.

USAID has been moved to the Department of State and has been dismantled. The status of the agency is currently being litigated.

Notification of Administrative Leave

As of 11:59 p.m. EST on Sunday, February 23, 2025, all USAID direct hire personnel, with the exception of designated personnel responsible for mission-critical functions, core leadership and/or specially designated programs, will be placed on administrative leave globally.

Concurrently, USAID is beginning to implement a Reduction-in-Force that will affect approximately 1,600 USAID personnel with duty stations in the United States.

Individuals that are impacted will receive specific notifications on February 23, 2025, with further instructions and information about their benefits and rights.

Designated essential personnel who are expected to continue working will be informed by Agency leadership February 23, 2025, by 5 p.m. EST.

For overseas personnel, USAID intends a voluntary Agency-funded return travel program and other benefits. USAID is committed to keeping its overseas personnel safe. Until they return home, personnel will retain access to Agency systems and to diplomatic and other resources.

In the coming week, we will provide details on how to retrieve personal items from the former USAID workspaces and return government issued devices.

Additional guidance is forthcoming, and all future updates/notices will continue to be communicated through official USAID channels and posted on USAID.gov for those without access to USAID systems.

VA Grants

The mission of the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) is to fulfill President Lincoln's promise to care for those who have served in our nation's military and for their families, caregivers, and survivors. VA has multiple Federal financial assistance (grants) programs that aid in VA's mission from community-based suicide prevention efforts to state Veteran home construction to adaptive sports and therapeutic arts programs to national cemetery and legacy programs.

Grants and cooperative agreements are two of many different types of federal financial assistance, which is the broad term used to describe the various ways the federal government distributes resources to eligible recipients.

Through a grant agreement or cooperative agreement, an agency makes payment to a recipient to carry out a public purpose authorized by law.

Grants and cooperative agreements follow a linear lifecycle (announce, apply, award, and implement).

This list is a snapshot of VA's grant portfolio at the time of this site's last update.

Grant and Per Diem Program

Program Description

VA's Grant and Per Diem (GPD) Program is offered annually (as funding permits) by the Department of Veterans Affairs to fund community agencies providing services to Veterans experiencing homelessness. The purpose of the transitional housing component of the program is to promote the development and provision of supportive housing and services with the goal of helping homeless Veterans achieve residential stability, increase their skill levels and/or income, and obtain greater self-determination. Additionally, the GPD Program offers Case Management grants to support housing retention for Veterans who were previously homeless and are transitioning to permanent housing.

Operational costs, including salaries, may be funded by the per diem component. For supportive housing, the maximum amount payable under the per diem is \$71.53 per day per Veteran housed. Veterans in supportive housing may be asked to pay rent if it does not exceed 30% of the Veteran's monthly-adjusted income. In addition, "reasonable" fees may be charged for services not paid with per diem funds. The maximum hourly per diem rate for a service center not connected with supportive housing is 1/8 of the daily cost of care, not to exceed \$8.94 per hour. Payment for a Veteran in a service center will not exceed 8 hours in any day.

Applications are only accepted in response to a Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) published in <u>Grants.gov</u>. Funds will be awarded to programs determined to be the most qualified.

A Guide to Funding Resources

The Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) program is a highly competitive program that encourages domestic small businesses to engage in Federal Research/Research and Development (R/R&D) that has the potential for commercialization. Through a competitive awards-based program, SBIR enables small businesses to explore their technological potential and provides the incentive to profit from its commercialization. By including qualified small businesses in the nation's R&D arena, high-tech innovation is stimulated, and the United States gains entrepreneurial spirit as it meets its specific research and development needs.

SBIR Mission and Program Goals

The mission of the SBIR program is to support scientific excellence and technological innovation through the investment of Federal research funds in critical American priorities to build a strong national economy.

The program's goals are four-fold:

- Stimulate technological innovation
- Meet Federal research and development needs.
- Foster and encourage participation in innovation and entrepreneurship by socially and economically disadvantaged persons.
- Increase private-sector commercialization of innovations derived from Federal research and development funding.

SBIR-Participating Agencies

Each year, Federal agencies with extramural research and development (R&D) budgets that exceed \$100 million are required to allocate 2.5 percent of their R&D budget to these programs. Currently,

- eDepartment of Commerce National Institute of Standards and Technology
- Department of Energy
- Department of Health and Human Services
- Department of Transportation
- National Aeronautics and Space Administration
- National Science Foundation

Each agency administers its own individual program within guidelines established by Congress. These agencies designate R&D topics in their solicitations and accept proposals from small businesses. Awards are made on a competitive basis after proposal evaluation.

Three-Phase Program

The SBIR Program is structured in three phases:

Phase I. The objective of Phase I is to establish the technical merit, feasibility, and commercial potential of the proposed R/R&D efforts and to determine the quality of performance of the small business awardee organization prior to providing further Federal support in Phase II. SBIR Phase I awards normally do not exceed \$150,000 total costs for 6 months.

Phase II. The objective of Phase II is to continue the R/R&D efforts initiated in Phase I. Funding is based on the results achieved in Phase I and the scientific and technical merit and commercial

potential of the project proposed in Phase II. Only Phase I awardees are eligible for a Phase II award. SBIR Phase II awards normally do not exceed \$1,000,000 total costs for 2 years.

Phase III. The objective of Phase III, where appropriate, is for the small business to pursue commercialization objectives resulting from the Phase I/II R/R&D activities. The SBIR program does not fund Phase III. Some Federal agencies, Phase III may involve follow-on non-SBIR funded R&D or production contracts for products, processes or services intended for use by the U.S. Government
