A BILL

To improve the emergency management capabilities of the Department of Veterans Affairs, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Advancing VA's Emer-
- 5 gency Response to (AVERT) Crises Act of 2023".

1 SEC. 2. REQUIREMENT FOR DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS 2 AFFAIRS TO IMPLEMENT A FULLY OPER-3 **ATIONAL** EMERGENCY **COMMUNICATIONS** 4 SYSTEM THROUGHOUT MEDICAL FACILITIES 5 OF DEPARTMENT. 6 (a) IMPLEMENTATION REQUIRED.—Not later than 7 two years after the date of the enactment of this Act, the 8 Secretary of Veterans Affairs shall implement a fully oper-9 ational high-frequency emergency communications system 10 throughout medical facilities of the Department of Veterans Affairs. 11 12 (b) PURPOSE OF SYSTEM.—The system required to 13 be implemented under subsection (a) shall— 14 (1) serve as a means of maintaining commu-15 nications at medical facilities of the Department

16 during disasters or emergencies without the need for
17 external infrastructure;

(2) enable emergency communications between
medical facilities of the Department and other government agencies with high-frequency communications capabilities; and

(3) be used to reestablish the provision of
health care services to veterans, maintain the situational awareness of staff of the Department, coordinate emergency response, and request resources as
needed.

1	(c) Consultation.—In preparing to carry out sub-
2	section (a), the Secretary of Veterans Affairs shall consult
3	with the Secretary of Homeland Security and the heads
4	of such other Federal agencies as the Secretary of Vet-
5	erans Affairs considers relevant, on best practices in im-
6	plementing high-frequency emergency communications.
7	(d) CONTRACTS.—
8	(1) IN GENERAL.—In carrying out subsection
9	(a), the Secretary of Veterans Affairs shall—
10	(A) renegotiate any contract in effect on
11	the day before the date of the enactment of this
12	Act that provides for the Resilient High Fre-
13	quency Radio Network of the Department; or
14	(B) solicit such new contracts as the Sec-
15	retary considers appropriate to provide the
16	high-frequency emergency communications serv-
17	ices and equipment necessary to carry out sub-
18	section (a).
19	(2) MAINTENANCE.—In carrying out subsection
20	(a), the Secretary shall ensure that a contract is in
21	effect for the high-frequency emergency communica-
22	tions system required by such subsection, including
23	for the provision of on-demand maintenance and
24	routine maintenance.

1	(e) REQUIREMENTS.—In carrying out subsection (a),
2	the Secretary shall—
3	(1) designate one office in the Central Office of
4	the Department to lead the implementation of the
5	emergency communications system required under
6	such subsection;
7	(2) create a staffing model to be distributed to
8	and used by medical facilities of the Department—
9	(A) to identify who at the facility level will
10	be responsible for verifying that the equipment
11	for such system is fully functional; and
12	(B) to ensure such system is monitored at
13	all times;
14	(3) create and distribute guidelines to medical
15	facilities of the Department, in conjunction with the
16	appropriately designated contracting officer or acqui-
17	sition center, for acceptance and installation of such
18	system, including demonstration of operability before
19	final inspection and acceptance of such system;
20	(4) ensure equipment functionality and operator
21	knowledge by creating and managing a training and
22	testing program to include—
23	(A) ensuring relevant staff receive com-
24	prehensive training regarding such system, in-

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1	cluding training on operation and maintenance
2	of such system;
3	(B) conducting internal exercises at all
4	medical facilities of the Department not less
5	frequently than once per year to test equipment
6	functionality and ensure staff have experience
7	operating the equipment in a simulated emer-
8	gency; and
9	(C) collaborating with the Secretary of
10	Homeland Security to determine the feasibility
11	of conducting multi-agency exercises every two
12	years;
13	(5) create and distribute general guidance to
14	medical facilities of the Department regarding where
15	emergency communications equipment should be lo-
16	cated in a medical facility, and collect and store in-
17	formation on the location of the equipment in each
18	medical facility;
19	(6) ensure medical facilities of the Department
20	include information on such system in each facility-
21	specific Comprehensive Emergency Management
22	Program, or successor program; and

(7) ensure medical facilities of the Department
regularly monitor the staffing levels and training
programs for such system to ensure enough trained

1	staff are available to monitor such system at all
2	times.
3	(f) Phased Implementation.—
4	(1) INITIAL LOCATIONS.—The Secretary of Vet-
5	erans Affairs shall ensure that the system required
6	by subsection (a) is initially installed and tested
7	throughout three Veterans Integrated Service Net-
8	works the Secretary shall select for the purposes of
9	this section.
10	(2) DETERMINATION OF FULLY OPERATIONAL
11	SYSTEM AND NOTICE TO CONGRESS.—
12	(A) IN GENERAL.—Once the system re-
13	quired by subsection (a) is installed and tested
14	in the three Veterans Integrated Service Net-
15	works pursuant to paragraph (1) and the Sec-
16	retary determines the system is fully oper-
17	ational in accordance with subparagraph (B)
18	and is able to be implemented at all medical fa-
19	cilities of the Department, the Secretary shall
20	submit to Congress notice of such determina-
21	tion.
22	(B) Determination.—The Secretary may
23	only determine that the system described in
24	subparagraph (A) is fully operational if—

1	(i) the Secretary validates the comple-
2	tion of training, certification, and system
3	use by the applicable workforce;
4	(ii) the system has been monitored by
5	the applicable workforce for a period of
6	three months;
7	(iii) the system has been in operation
8	for a continuous period of three months
9	without any system outages; and
10	(iv) the Secretary has completed two
11	training exercises involving all test installa-
12	tion sites.
13	(3) Full implementation.—Once the Sec-
14	retary has determined pursuant to paragraph (2)
15	that the system required by subsection (a) is fully
16	operational and submitted notice to Congress of
17	such determination in accordance with such para-
18	graph, the Secretary shall implement the system at
19	all medical facilities of the Department.
20	(g) INITIAL REPORT.—
21	(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days
22	after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Sec-
23	retary shall submit to the Committee on Veterans'
24	Affairs of the Senate and the Committee on Vet-
25	erans' Affairs of the House of Representatives a re-

1	port on the plans of the Secretary to implement the
2	system required by subsection (a).
3	(2) ELEMENTS.—The report submitted pursu-
4	ant to paragraph (1) shall include the following:
5	(A) A detailed timeline of the planned im-
6	plementation of the system required by sub-
7	section (a).
8	(B) An identification of the three Veterans
9	Integrated Service Networks selected under
10	subsection $(f)(1)$.
11	(C) A description of the specific metrics
12	and benchmarks the Secretary plans to use to
13	make the determination under subsection $(f)(2)$.
14	(D) A description of the plans of the Sec-
15	retary for contracting under subsection $(d)(1)$.
16	(E) A description of the plans of the Sec-
17	retary for contracting under subsection $(d)(2)$.
18	(F) A spending plan for implementation of
19	the system.
20	(G) An identification of which office the
21	Department has designated under subsection
22	(e)(1).
23	(H) An identification of the staffing struc-
24	ture of the office identified in subparagraph
25	(G), including any plans to change the struc-

1	ture of such office to more effectively imple-
2	ment the system.
3	(I) Details on the roles and responsibilities
4	of each of the following entities in implementing
5	the system:
6	(i) The office identified pursuant to
7	subparagraph (G).
8	(ii) Any other offices of the Depart-
9	ment involved at the Central Office of the
10	Department.
11	(iii) Veterans Integrated Service Net-
12	works.
13	(iv) Medical facilities of the Depart-
14	ment.
15	(J) A description of the staffing model re-
16	quired under subsection $(e)(2)$.
17	(K) Details on the training required under
18	subsection $(e)(4)(A)$, including—
19	(i) the components of the training;
20	(ii) the duration of the training;
21	(iii) the frequency of the training;
22	(iv) which employees will be required
23	to take such training;

1	(v) whether the training will be con-
2	ducted by the Department or a contractor;
3	and
4	(vi) how the Secretary plans to over-
5	see and track completion of the training;
6	(L) A description of the guidelines created
7	and distributed under subsection $(e)(5)$.
8	(M) A description of how the Secretary
9	plans to ensure medical facilities of the Depart-
10	ment include information on the system in each
11	facility-specific Comprehensive Emergency Man-
12	agement Program, or successor program.
13	(N) A description of how the Secretary
14	plans to ensure medical facilities of the Depart-
15	ment regularly monitor the staffing levels for
16	the system to ensure enough trained staff are
17	available to monitor the system at all times.
18	(O) A description of any updates the Sec-
19	retary plans to make to the directives of the
20	Department on the topic of emergency commu-
21	nications.
22	(P) An assessment of whether other facili-
23	ties of the Department, including facilities of
24	the Veterans Benefits Administration and facili-
25	ties of the National Cemetery Administration,

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1	require the implementation of a high-frequency
2	emergency communications system, and if so—
3	(i) the plan of the Secretary to imple-
4	ment a high-frequency emergency commu-
5	nications system throughout such facilities;
6	and
7	(ii) whether the Secretary requires ac-
8	tion by Congress to carry out such plan.
9	(h) ANNUAL REPORTS.—
10	(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 90 days after
11	the date on which the Secretary completes imple-
12	mentation of the system under subsection (a), and
13	not less frequently than once each year thereafter,
14	the Secretary shall submit to the Committee on Vet-
15	erans' Affairs of the Senate and the Committee on
16	Veterans' Affairs of the House of Representatives a
17	report on the operations of such system.
18	(2) CONTENTS.—Each report submitted pursu-
19	ant to paragraph (1) shall include, for the period
20	covered by the report, the following:
21	(A) Information on whether each site
22	hosting the system required by subsection (a) is
23	adequately staffed to monitor the system 24
24	hours per day for seven days per week.

1	(B) Information on whether any outages
2	have occurred with respect to such system since
3	the previous report, or, for the first report,
4	whether any outages have occurred since the
5	full implementation of such system under sub-
6	section $(f)(3)$.
7	(C) The results of internal and external ex-
8	ercises conducted to demonstrate functionality
9	of such system.
10	(D) Whether any contract renegotiations
11	or modifications or new contracts have occurred
12	for either the procurement of high-frequency
13	emergency communications equipment, mainte-
14	nance, or training.
15	(E) Any updated guidance or trainings
16	provided to employees tasked with overseeing
17	such system.
18	(i) OIG REPORT.—Not later than three years after
19	the date of the enactment of this Act, the Inspector Gen-
20	eral of the Department of Veterans Affairs shall submit
21	to the Committee on Veterans' Affairs of the Senate and
22	the Committee on Veterans' Affairs of the House of Rep-
23	resentatives a report on the implementation by the De-
24	partment of the system required by subsection (a), which
25	shall include an analysis of the following:

1	(1) The effectiveness and functionality of the
2	system.
3	(2) The staffing model required under sub-
4	section $(e)(2)$.
5	(3) The level of coordination by the Central Of-
6	fice of the Department with medical facilities of the
7	Department in helping those facilities implement
8	and maintain the system.
9	(4) The effectiveness of the training and testing
10	program required under subsection $(e)(4)$.
11	(5) Any difficulties with ensuring trained staff
10	are available to monitor the system at all times.

 communication and streamline emergency prepared ness and response efforts of the Department.

6 SEC. 4. REPORT ON REGIONAL READINESS CENTERS OF 7 DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS.

14	gencies, including natural disasters, public health
15	emergencies, or Fourth Mission activations of the
16	Department, with respect to which each Regional
17	Readiness Center would be able to provide sufficient
18	resources to respond to, based on the current capac-
19	ity of the Regional Readiness Center.
20	(8) Any plans of the Secretary to realign or
21	change the number of Regional Readiness Centers.

1SEC. 5. IMPROVEMENTS TO THE EMERGENCY CACHE PRO-2GRAM OF DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AF-3FAIRS.

4 Not later than 180 days after the date of the enact5 ment of this Act, the Secretary of Veterans Affairs shall
6 carry out the following:

7 (1) TRACKING SYSTEM AND MINIMUM TIME
8 FRAMES.—Establish a tracking system and min9 imum time frames by which the Emergency Phar10 macy Service initiates resupply orders to make sure
11 emergency caches and emergency pharmacy vehicles
12 are fully stocked with unexpired inventory. Such
13 time frames shall account for—

14 (A) any extension of the shelf life of inven15 tory under the Shelf Life Extension Program;
16 and

17 (B) historical data of the Department of
18 Veterans Affairs on the time it typically takes
19 the Department to reorder, receive, and restock
20 emergency caches or emergency pharmacy vehi21 cles, as the case may be.

(2) ACCOUNTABILITY MECHANISM.—Create an
accountability mechanism to ensure the Emergency
Pharmacy Service and the Watch Office are maintaining accurate and complete records of emergency
cache activations.

1	(3) Guidelines on Authorized Access.—
2	Provide guidelines for facilities of the Department
3	regarding which individuals are authorized to access
4	the emergency caches.
5	(4) Guidelines on responsibility for dis-
6	TRIBUTION.—Provide guidelines for facilities of the
7	Department regarding which individuals are respon-
8	sible for distributing the contents of the emergency
9	cache if activated.
10	(5) TRAINING.—Provide all Department em-
11	ployees identified by the Secretary under paragraphs
12	(3) and (4) with a training that includes information
13	on—

7 Not later than 90 days after the date of the enact-8 ment of this Act, the Secretary of Veterans Affairs shall, 9 after consulting with the Administrator of the Federal 10 Emergency Management Agency, submit to the Committee on Veterans' Affairs of the Senate, the Committee 11 12 on Veterans' Affairs of the House of Representatives, the 13 Committee on Homeland Security and Government Affairs of the Senate, and the Committee on Homeland Security 14 15 of the House of Representatives a report regarding—
